## NATIVE PLANT GARDEN AT BORDENTOWN LIBRARY

The Bordentown City Environmental Commission (BCEC) has created a native plant demonstration garden at the Bordentown Library on Union Street. Visitors will be able to see a variety of perennial wildflowers and shrubs that are native to New Jersey, and learn about why they are good choices for landscaping plants in their backyards.

Native plants are beneficial to the environment for a number of reasons: they are drought-resistant and require minimal water; no chemical pesticides or fertilizers are needed for these plants to thrive; and they provide food and shelter for birds, bees and butterflies.

Native plants in the garden include:

Black-eyed Susan (*Rudbeckia hirta*), Cardinal Flower (*Lobelia cardinalis*), Indian Grass (*Sorghastrum nutans*), Inkberry Holly (*Ilex glabra*), Little Bluestem (*Schizachyrium scoparium*), New England Aster (*Aster Novae-angliae*), New York Aster (*Aster novi-belgi*), Purple Joe-Pye (*Eupatorium purpureum*), Seaside Goldenrod (*Solidago nemoralis*), Black Chokeberry (*Aronia melanocarpa*), Sweet Pepperbush (*Clethra alnifolia*), and Spotted Horsemint (*Monarda punctata*).

Additional plants will be installed in Spring 2009. An interpretive brochure, explaining the benefits of native plants and characteristics (sun/shade, dry/wet, size, color) will be available at the Bordentown Library in Spring 2009. Funding for the plant materials was provided by a bequest from the U.S. Charitable Trust (Henry G. Tutek, Esq., Donor Advisor). Plants were purchased from Pinelands Nursery (www.pinelandsnursery.com) in Columbus, NJ, which specializes in native plants.

### Lime Kiln Trail Update

Lots of progress on the creation of Lime Kiln Park this summer. Thirteen students from Princeton University, led by Bordentown City resident David Brown, removed invasive plants in September (including purple looses-trife, chinese bush clover, and crown vetch). In October, students of the Delaware Valley College Landscape Architecture program, led by professor Eve Minson, will analyze the geography, habitat and for their Fall class project. Results and recommendations for park development will be presented at a public meeting this Winter. Additionally, an effort has begun to catalog the historic RR buildings on Lime Kiln Park for possible future use as an interpretive center for Bordentown City's unique history in the development of the railroad network in the United States.

### Eagle Scout Projects
